Storytelling event

The BNA is organizing an event that we've never done before: an evening of storytelling by our neighbors!

Afifi Durr, a long-time Briarcrest resident as well as a long-time member of the Seattle Storytellers Guild, will kick off the evening with a story about leaving Lebanon in her youth. There will be another invited person or two relating stories about their past. And perhaps you will have a story to tell! In the open-mic part of the program, each person will be given 5 to 7 minutes to speak. Maybe you have a story about Briarcrest or Shoreline or some other early or recent memory that you'd like to share.

From her experience in the Storytellers Guild, Afifi offers these suggestions for one way that a person might prepare to tell a story. Think about the location and time of your story, the people involved, the problem you encountered and how it was fixed, and what lesson you gained from the experience. Of course, it's important to practice telling your story (with an eye on the clock)!

If you'd like more guidance and practice in storytelling, here's an excellent, low-cost workshop you can take with a delightful professional storyteller who both tells and collects stories internationally. Easy-to-Tell Tales: A Workshop with Dr. Margaret Read MacDonald, Sat., Jan. 23, 9:00-1:00, at the Nordic Heritage Center, 3014 NW 67th St., Seattle.
