Update on the Briarcrest Neighborhood Association

From the weekly meals at POPY's Cafe to Patty Pan Cooperative and from Briarcrest Elementary PTSA to the South Woods neighbors, the Briarcrest neighborhood in Shoreline is and will continue to remain a vibrant community.

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For a long time, the Briarcrest Neighborhood Association has been active in developing a sense of community for the neighborhood. In recent years, the organization has experienced a drop in the number of people attending meetings, pushing more and more of the tasks of running the organization onto fewer and fewer people. One consequence is that the association did not apply for any city mini-grants over the past couple of years, since it has seen fewer people at BNA-sponsored work parties.

At the last meeting of the BNA, in October, the attendees unanimously decided to not to continue monthly meetings for the time being. The members in attendance wanted to make sure the BNA could be in a good position to succeed in fulfilling its mission to develop and maintain a strong community in Briarcrest. We hope the organization can be reinvigorated in 2015, perhaps beginning with a great party. (See party item below.)

If pressing issues for the neighborhood arise, we can call a meeting or meetings as desired.

In the meantime, a few people are continuing to provide news about Briarcrest neighborhood through this newsletter, and members of two email groups share information: **Google Group** and **Briarcrest Next Door**. Also, Alice Keller is now representing the neighborhood at the monthly meetings of the Shoreline Council of Neighborhoods.

Within Shoreline (and Briarcrest) there are several other ways to get on-line information about what's happening and what might affect our neighborhood. The South Woods Neighbors has its own Facebook group. At the city-wide level, the City of Shoreline has its own Facebook page and has developed Alert Shoreline for people to follow. Diane Hettrick publishes lots of information about Shoreline at Shoreline Area News. Finally, Secret Shoreline is a great Facebook page.

Several great organizations in Briarcrest continue to work and advocate on behalf of the neighborhood. The Briarcrest, Kellogg, and Shorecrest PTSAs are active. Briarcrest has more churches than any other neighborhood in Shoreline. Patty Pan Cooperative has established itself as a community meeting place at the corner of 27th and 158th.
